FALL ACTIVITIES


Autumn reminds us of falling leaves, pumpkins, apples, and cool weather. In this section, we are going to do some fun, fall-themed activities.




Make a Pizza

Directions

Let's make a pizza! Color in the pizza sauce. You can choose red for marinara, green for pesto, or any other color you want! After coloring, choose your toppings. Cut them out and paste them on your pizza! (Parents: Ask, "How does it taste? Yummy or yucky? Hot or cold?")

WINTER ACTIVITIES


Snow. Cold toes and noses. Hot chocolate. Warm clothes and a fire in the fireplace. Let's talk about winter!

Directions

Following Directions

Practice the concepts *big*, *medium*, and *small*. Have your child point to the big snowball, the medium snowball, and the small snowball on the snowman they made. See if they can find other big, medium, and small things around your house.

More Activities

- If you have cotton balls, have your child glue them onto the body of one of the snowmen they made. Talk about how they feel *soft*.
- Build your own snowman together: Fill three plastic trash bags with crumpled-up paper, newspaper, and magazines in order to make them round. Add a face with markers or shapes cut out of paper.
- Make a snowman with marshmallows. Stack three marshmallows on top of each other. Either connect them with a toothpick or with bits of frosting to keep them together. Use pretzels for the arms. With frosting, attach candies for eyes, a nose, and mouth.

Spring makes us think of flowers, sweet smells, and green grass. In this section, we will celebrate all things spring.




I Can Hike

- Help your child make a collage of some of the items you found. Glue them onto a piece of sturdy paper or cardboard.

- Play a guessing game while you are outside. Start with "I spy something (name a color or attribute)" and take turns guessing what has been spied.

SUMMER ACTIVITIES


Hot days, cold ice cream, and jumping in the pool. Let's do some fun activities all about summer!

Directions
